Praying Our Way Through Lent

The forty days prior to Easter, excluding Sundays is the season of the church year we call Lent. This time of preparation for Holy Week and Easter is usually a time of introspection and personal spiritual growth. Sometimes people "give up" something for Lent, other times they "take on" a spiritual discipline to help them grow in their faith.

This year I invite you to pray every day during Lent. Some of you already pray every day, but some of you probably do not. Too often we think of prayer as a chore instead of something that can be incorporated into our daily lives.

If you read poems, thoughts for the day, scriptures or daily meditations that are inspirational, you are praying. If you take a walk every day and hold God in your heart as you do, you are praying. If you dance in gratitude for life, you are praying. If you taste and see that the Lord is good when you eat, you are praying. If you sit in quiet, being mindful of the One who created you, you are praying. If you sing spiritual songs or write inspirational poetry, you are praying. There are so many ways to pray!

This year many of you have submitted Lenten Devotions, inspirational quotes, stories, scriptures or poems that have helped you to see God in a new way. Your contribution will help others pray this Lent. We will email each of you the complete Lenten booklet on February 16. You are invited to read a new devotion each day and to pray for the person who offered that inspiration. It is tempting to just sit down and read through the whole booklet, but restrain yourself and plan to read just one a day. It is a beautiful way to pray your way through Lent!

If you would like to submit a Lenten Devotion and have not yet, it isn't too late. We will be accepting submissions until February 10th. We will also be posting these Lenten inspirations on the website and Facebook during the season of Lent.

Last year I had a couple of people ask if we could hold an Ash Wednesday service. I told them that I promised my first year in ministry here to keep the schedule of services the same as it was the previous year. We talked about holding a small service the following year. Well, here we are a year later and we can't have an in-person services. Who would have anticipated that we would be in the midst of a global pandemic? I never imagined that we would be only live streaming worship.

So, we are going to do something just a little bit different to introduce you to Ash Wednesday. You are invited to drive your car up to the back door of the church for "Drive By Ashes."

I will be at the rear door between 12 noon and 1 pm on Ash Wednesday February 17th. Just pull up in your car and I'll bring the ashes to you. I will sanitize my hands and wear a mask and you'll receive the ashes outside. Perhaps next year we can have an inperson Ash Wednesday service, but let's give "Drive By Ashes" a try this year!

The ashes are made from last year's Palms and remind us that God made humanity from dust and that in the end we all return to dust. Receiving the ashes of forgiveness is a beautiful way to begin observing the season of Lent.

I hope that you will find Lent meaningful and inspirational this year! Here is another fun way to observe Lent: making Pretzel Prayers. There is a legend that medieval monks baked pretzels to teach people about prayer. Cross your arms over your chest, one hand on the opposite shoulder, look down and voila...it's the shape of a pretzel. The recipe for pretzels is simple and when the dough is twisted into the shape of a pretzel you find that there are three holes representing the Holy Trinity.

Here is the recipe for Lenten Pretzels reprinted from "Essential Lent."



Ingredients (Makes 12 pretzels)

Soda Solution:

1/3 cup baking soda 5 cups water

Pretzel dough:

1 ½ cups all-purpose flour 1 ½ cups wheat flour 1 teaspoon baking soda 1 cup buttermilk

¹/₄ cup honey 2 Tablespoons kosher salt for tops of pretzels

Instructions:

- *Preheat oven to 400 degrees.
- *Dissolve soda and water in a stock pot and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and set aside.
- *Sift together flour and soda. Add buttermilk and honey, stirring until dough pulls together.
- *Pour dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead until firm.
- *Divide dough into 12 equal pieces.
- *Roll each into a long, snake-like piece and form traditional pretzel shape.
- *Pinch the ends to seal it and dip pretzel in soda water solution.
- *Place on lightly greased baking sheet and sprinkle with kosher salt
- *Bake in the oven for 10 minutes or until golden brown.
- *Move to a cooling rack for a few minutes before eating!

I hope that you find many different ways to pray this Lent! May God bless you, and all of us as we seek to deepen our faith and grow in the Spirit. Amen.

Spotlight: Rhonda & Mike Nyerges

Fifty years ago, Rhonda Mosher, a freshman from Buffalo and Mike Nyerges, a transfer student from Monroe Community College in Rochester met at Geneseo State College. He asked her where the Philosophy Department was (to impress her, he says). She must have been impressed, because five years later they were married.

They are the parents of two boys. Aaron, the oldest is a college professor in Sidney, Australia and Steven lives in Chicago where he is in engineering management, internal marketing and sales for a Japanese firm.

They came to Canandaigua in 1987, when Mike was named Administrator of Wood Library. He held that position for about six or seven years. When he was offered a position in Pittsford, the Administrator of the Canandaigua schools called and offered him the position of Department Head of the Canandaigua school libraries. This meant the family didn't need to consider moving or transplanting their children to new schools. He also spent time as Director for the Geneva and the Mid-Hudson Libraries.

When her children were young, Rhonda worked part time as a nurse in the F. F. Thompson Birthing Center. When the boys were in their teens, she enrolled in the University of Rochester and earned a Masters Degree in Nursing, graduating in 1995 as a Nurse Practitioner. She spent twenty years at Strong Women's Health Practice and Planned Parenthood. When her grandson, Miles was born in 2014, she retired and took care of him.

Because of COVID, they are staying close to home, but are still busy. Mike is involved in art photography when he isn't helping the Arts Counsel manage their

web site. His artwork has been shown in the Canandaigua area. Rhonda is President of the Canandaigua P.E.O. which involves planning zoom and social-distance meetings for thirty-one women, raising money to give as scholarships and searching out applicants for the scholarships. They take walks every day and maintain a wellness schedule.

They miss their two grandsons, seven year old Miles and three year old Asher and will likely head for Chicago to see them as soon as the COVID crisis allows. They hope to return to Australia in November of 2021, when their son turns forty.

They have travelled cross-country and seen the U.S. Next on their "to do" list are trips to Italy, where they have relatives in the agro business, Switzerland where Rhonda was an exchange student, and England to research her genealogy.

Rhonda grew up in the United Church of Christ in Buffalo and Mike, although he was baptized Catholic, grew up as a Lutheran. They moved around a lot when the children were small and found the Methodist Church to give the boys a Christian education. After they grew up, their son Aaron sent her a copy of Caroline Cowles Richards' diary from Australia. That was what drew them to the First Congregational Church, where they felt "at home." She says "I loved the people, the simple and elegant sanctuary and the openminded, non-hierarchial, action-oriented approach to daily faith practice.... It was a perfect fit." Mike says his appreciation for our congregation is simply rooted in how it lives out his favorite scripture passage, Micah 6:8.



2021 is an important year for us. This October will mark the 20th anniversary of the What If Foundation — the moment we became a 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to supporting the children and families in Ti Plas Kazo.

Our founder, Margaret Trost shared a vision with the legendary Father Gerard Jean-Juste after her first trip to Haiti and took a leap of faith. She asked her friends at home for help, and with a single miraculous check, she and Father Jeri began a journey that changed the lives of thousands of Haitians, along with their own.

That first check funded a meal program, once a week. But the vision was so much bigger: fighting hunger and creating access to education as the path to a brighter future. As Father Jeri used to say "First we feed the children, we keep them alive. Then we focus on education." And thanks to the compassion and support of our donors, their beautiful vision slowly became a reality. Once a week became two, then three, then four, and now 20 years later, our Haitian partners serve 800 children a nourishing meal five days a week.

Money was raised for scholarships to see talented students pursue their potential, while Margaret and Father Jeri dreamed of a campus of Na Rive's own.

Together, we built the Father Jeri School in 2016, and now over 375 students can access one of the best educations in Haiti in a nurturing environment.

And I'm thrilled to report that despite last year's challenges, Father Jeri School students are thriving — 95% graduated from high school last year and at least 30% of them received full state scholarships to the university of their choice, an incredible accomplishment given very few spots are awarded each year in Haiti.
